Background Have students read the scientific information that helps explain the ordinary feelings of fear we experience. Explain that everyone experiences fear in varying degrees. The knowledge and insight into fear that science can bring help us understand the purposes fear has for the human body and human survival. The article identifies different types of fear and shows that understanding the fear response helps control it.

SETTING A PURPOSE Direct students to use the Setting a Purpose prompt to focus their reading.

Cite Evidence (LINES 1-5)



while reading, they use facts and details from the text and their own knowledge to make a logical guess.

CITE TEXT EVIDENCE Have students reread lines 1-5. Ask them to make an inference about what it is like to ride a roller coaster and to identify text details and their own knowledge that support their inference. (Riding a roller coaster is scary but fun; hang on the handrail, sweating, heart racing, bracing for the wild ride; have ridden or watched others ride.)

Analyze Structure (LINES 6-12)



Explain that informational texts are often organized using text features, such as boldface or colored type, headings (titles), or subheadings (section titles). Each text feature indicates specific information the author wants the reader to know.

CITE TEXT EVIDENCE Have students describe how the subheading "What Is Fear?" and its section fit into the structure of the article. (The section is key because it provides a common definition of fear for the reader.)






